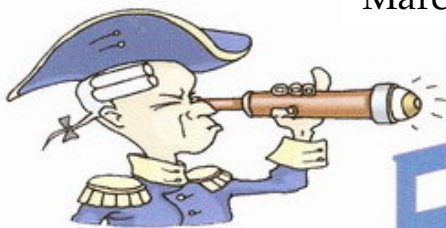

From the East:

190 West to sharp curve south in downtown Cleve-
land. Off at Chester St., East to 37th St., Right
and then right onto Euclid Ave. to Masonic parking lot at
36th St. or continue on 37th St. to Prospect Ave. then
right to 36th St. and right on Euclid Ave. Park at
University Hotel.

From the West:

190 East past intersection with I77 North. Off at
Chester St. Right to 37th St. Right and then right onto
Euclid Ave. to Masonic parking lot at 36th St. or con-
tinue on 37th St. to Prospect Ave. then right on 36th
St. and right to Euclid Ave. Park at University Ho-
tel.

From the South:

I71 or I77 North past intersection with I77. Off at
Chester St. and then follow above West directions.

They have their work cut out for them as many of the exhibits have won gold at other venues. We are particularly aware of that of Greg Shoults who gave us a preview back in December of his Washington Franklin coils. This is only the second time he has shown his eight pages after having won many single-frame gold and best of shows awards.

Also I have previewed Nick Kirke's exhibit on New York Foreign Mail fancy cancels. If you are familiar with this popular subject, perhaps you will remember Bill Weiss' Grand Award exhibit on this subject many years ago at our March Party. As good as that exhibit was, in my opinion, Nick's is even better.

Last year Hugh Feldman presented his exhibit "Mail Carried by Water in the USA (1814-1875)" for which he won gold and the Reserve Grand and gave a talk on his new book on contract mails by water. Well, he is back again this year with a new exhibit and another talk as well on "Sail to Steam on the Atlantic".

Dr. James Milgram, another renowned postal history researcher will have his exhibit "Unofficial Registration of Mail in The United States 1845-1855" and will present his new book *Federal Civil War Postal History*.

Looks like another banner year that includes the meetings of the U.S. Philatelic Classics Society and the Carriers and Locals Society.
