## <u>Club Chit Chat</u> Kurt Laubinger Wins!

Once again Kurt has won a gold, this one at NAPEX for his exhibit The Politically Inspired Covers of Bruce R. McIntyre, 1936-1960. The exhibit is comprised of over 145 political event covers that he collected over a period of 35 years. They are all hand-drawn and painted with watercolors. Each tells its own story through the cachet, and they are one of a kind. Take a look at this example. Stuart Symington, Democratic candidate for President in 1960, signed the cover during his visit to Akron.



McIntyre was a commercial photographer and news cameraman from Warren and started producing his covers as early as the late 1920s. He certainly had a great sense of humor as well as illustrated in this 1960 cover for the Democratic national convention held in Los Angeles. "World's Greatest Assemblage of Braying Jackasses"!



#### Mike Bass Wins Gold!

Mike is the president of the Society of Israel Philatelists and exhibited at the March Party this year showing *Foreign Post Offices in the Holyland, 1852-1814*. He went on to win a gold at the World Stamp Championship Exhibition Israel 2008 international show which took place in Tel Aviv, Israel from May 14-21. Seventy countries were represented with 2,500 frames of exhibits.

This postal history exhibit traces the development of European sponsored postal services in the Holyland during the Ottoman Empire period. Austria,

> France, and Russia include forerunner mail utilizing diplomatic consuls, commercially contracted services. and authorized forwarding agents to handle the mail. Eventually, Germany and Italy joined the Universal Postal Union and developed official post offices in the Holyland. Each foreign post office is

presented in the order established beginning with the Austrian Consular office in Caifa.

Like Kurt, Mike has been collecting for 30 years with special interests including the Interim Period and Forerunners of Holyland philately.

Congratulations to both of you guys. Great work. As an active exhibitor, I know the work that goes into put-

ting together an exhibit, even when it doesn't garner a gold.

However, there is real satisfaction in showing the philatelic world, "Here's what I have been collecting and studying all these years. I think my collection is something special. What do you think of it?"

# **Looking Ahead December 4 Meeting**

Greg Shoults has been collecting the Washington Franklin coils for quite a number of successful years. He has exhibited at the March Party every year since 2004 and this year won the Best Single Frame Exhibit Award for his 1914 issue perf. 10, the first time it's been shown. He also won the same for the 1910, perf. 8.5 issue in '06, and the 1912 perf. 8.5 issue in 2007.

This past year he has been very busy on the World Series of Philately show circuit with Best in Show for the 1910 issue at BALPEX and golds at NAPEX and NOJEX. The 1912 series won him golds at NOJEX, ROPEX and Plymouth. He carried the 1914 exhibit on to Plymouth, ROPEX and INDY-PEX where he won Best in Show at all of them.

For our Dec. meeting he will probably talk about his new multiframe exhibit on both rotary press coil issues that will be shown for the first time at the upcoming CHICAGOPEX.
